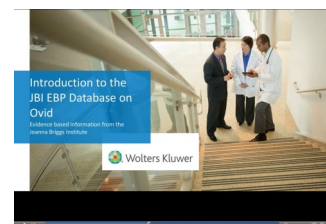

This month’s question is, ‘Does wearing open toe sandals during summer increase or decrease the risk of catching a fungal foot infection?’

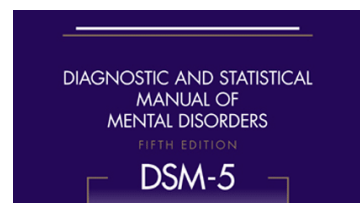
The answer is neither. According to a study published in the [British Medical Journal \(theBMJ\)](#), there is no notable variation in fungal elements found in toenail samples regardless of the season or month of sampling.

eTG Complete Update

For the new [eTG](#) complete release, the formats of tables and drug recommendations have been improved. In response to user feedback, the drug index has been expanded to include drugs and doses displayed in tables, and the drug index will continue to be expanded over the coming year. To access the drug index, click on the **Browse drug index** button under the main search box on the eTG complete homepage. Type the generic name of the drug to see a drop-down list of indications for which the drug is recommended in eTG complete. Clicking on an entry will take you to the dose regimen for the indication.
