Giving Out Drugs Like Candy...

'Antimicrobial drug resistance is a global problem, and reducing antibiotic use is the most important clinical response. Australian GPs are reported to overprescribe antibiotics, but the extent has not been quantified.'

This statement is what prompted a recent study, published in the <u>Medical Journal of</u> <u>Australia</u> (MJA), that compared the current rate of antibiotic prescribing for acute respiratory infections (ARIs) in Australian general practice with the recommendations in the most widely consulted therapeutic guidelines in Australia (Therapeutic Guidelines).

The study found that an estimated 5.97 million ARI cases per year are managed in Australian general practice and that antibiotics are prescribed in these cases at rates 4-9 times as high as those recommended by the Therapeutic Guidelines.

The authors of the study stated that the data provides a basis for setting absolute targets for reducing antibiotic prescribing in Australian general practice.

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
CIAP's Book of the Month — Death or Disability?: The 'Carmentis Machine' and decision-making for critically ill children
