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#### **Music Therapy: Striking a Chord**

JANA® The Journal of the American Medical Association A controversial study published in the <u>Journal of the American Medical Association</u> (JAMA), suggests that the increasingly popular intervention of music therapy in children with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) has no significant benefit in improving communication and social skills.

In the randomised clinical trial, 364 participants were either assigned to music therapy, or enhanced standard care. No significant difference in symptom severity was observed between the two participant groups over 5 months. These results contrast with those of a popular Cochrane Collaboration meta-analysis by Geret-segger et al., which found music therapy to be associated with significant improvement in core symptoms of ASD.

The contradictory results also highlight an important debate concerning the differential merits of a large RCT and a comprehensive meta-analysis. So was it the intervention or the study that didn't work?

#### **The Question**

Which branch of science directly translates to the study of 'suffering'?

Pathology literally translates to the study of suffering (Greek *pathos* = suffering, *logos* = study); more prosaically, the term pathology is invoked to represent the study of disease.


# CIAP Tips & Tricks — Clinical Equipment User Manual
